VERSA PROGRAM GROWS: FOSTERING DIVERSE STEM RESEARCH NATIONWIDE

This past summer, the School of Biological Sciences hosted 12 undergraduate research fellows studying discipline-based STEM education research as part of the NSF-funded VERSA (Virtual Education Research in STEM Academy) program. These diverse VERSA fellows came from colleges and universities nationwide, ranging from MiraCosta College to Michigan State University. They were mentored by a coalition of STEM

education researchers from all over campus, including faculty from Biological Sciences, the Jacobs School of Engineering, and Physical Sciences. The VERSA program, run by PI Melinda T. Owens of Neurobiology and Thom Bussey of Biochemistry, aims to help undergraduates who would not otherwise be able to gain research experiences a chance to do research that can make a real difference in STEM education. Many of their research projects examined the effect of educational interventions and practices on minoritized students. The VERSA program has grown from 12 students, up from 4 students last year, and we hope to continue strong in the future.



MADELEINE DUQUETTE AND ELIZABETH VILLA AWARDED HHMI GILLIAM FELLOWSHIP

The Howard Hughes Medical Institute (HHMI) has awarded the prestigious 2024 Gilliam Fellowship to UC San Diego School of Biological Sciences' PhD student Madeleine Duquette and her advisor Professor Elizabeth Villa, marking them as the only recipients in the San Diego area among 50 student-adviser pairs selected nationwide. The fellowship provides \$53,000 annually for up to three years, promoting mentorship in developing new scientific leaders. Duquette, a third-year graduate student, utilizes advanced cryo-electron technology to research HIV-1/AIDS, specifically focusing on the virus's Env glycoprotein. The program, in honor of James H. Gilliam, Jr., emphasizes the critical role of advisors and includes a comprehensive mentorship development course for them to support inclusive graduate training environments. Background & Journey

A first-generation student, she earned her Bachelor's in Biology from the University of San Diego, where undergraduate research experiences steered her away from medical school. After participating in Teach for America and earning a Master's in Secondary Education, Dr. Ochoa pursued her Ph.D. in Development & Stem Cell Biology at Northwestern University. Her postdoctoral work with Dr. Karen Oegema at UCSD further honed her expertise in developmental biology. Her diverse background, combining teaching and research, has significantly shaped her career path. Dr. Ochoa's graduate work focused on neural crest development and its implications for cancer research, reflecting her commitment to advancing both scientific knowledge and inclusive education practices.

Empowering Education

Dr. Stacy Ochoa, a first-generation student and accomplished researcher, brings a unique perspective to UCSD's biology department. With a strong emphasis on community cultural wealth, Dr. Ochoa recognizes the importance of family in her culture and understands the challenges faced by first-generation students. Her experiences navigating complex systems like FAFSA informs her approach to education. Dr. Ochoa is passionate about addressing the "hidden curriculum" in STEM fields, focusing on inclusive pedagogies and active learning practices to support diverse student populations. Her commitment to building community and mentoring students throughout their academic journey reflects her dedication to creating a more inclusive and supportive environment in higher education.

Future Plans

Dr. Stacy Ochoa, a passionate educator and researcher at UCSD, is shaping the future of biology education with her innovative approaches. As a former IRACDA fellow and current faculty member, Dr. Ochoa is dedicated to implementing inclusive pedagogies in biology courses, particularly focusing on introductory classes. Her work aims to decrease equity gaps among Latinx and other underrepresented groups in STEM. Dr. Ochoa's vision extends to creating a <u>STEM Pathways</u> sister program at UCSD, which would support community college students in their transition to university. With a strong emphasis on building community and fostering critical skills, Dr. Ochoa is committed to developing a culture of inclusivity and support at UCSD.





STEMinist Newtork


